
empathize with others when you're working in their shoes too," he stated.



Another snow marker passing our rightside window— this indicated the road was still under us as we crept over Wolf Creek Pass. Other than an occasional semi-truck chaining up or snowplow helping keep the pass open for us, there was very little traffic the next 20 miles. Google map guiding us through the whiteout.

"We made it!" Acknowledging our success as we pulled to a stop in the driveway. Then finding our way into the house. As we opened the door, warm air and visible light greeted us, which felt so welcoming. It didn't take long before crawling into bed while the winter storm passed. The next morning was blue skies over a beautiful landscape. It was exciting to walk out and see the surroundings of my new home. "It's perfect!" I am here to stay and ready to go to work for you.

You live in an incredibly beautiful place, and I am so happy to be here. It is a great honor and privilege to be serving you.
