Who Owns What?

Electric Co-op Owned Equipment vs Member-Owned Equipment

This graphic depicts equipment owned by the Co-op (in gold) and the Member (in blue). If a storm damages any equipment owned by the Co-op, we are responsible for repairs. If a storm or other failure damages any Member-owned equipment, the Member is responsible for repairs. Members should hire a licensed electrician when making any repairs to Member-owned equipment. Knowing this may save you— the member— money, as you may be charged if REC is called to respond to member-owned equipment.

unplug any appliances or other items in the area not receiving power, then flip the breaker back to the ON position.

Check to see if power is restored. Wait a few seconds, then slowly begin plugging in and turning on the electrical equipment to determine which item is causing the overload. If the circuit trips again when an item is plugged in, that item is causing the overload. Try moving it to a different outlet in your home.

If the circuit continues to trip, or if it won't flip to the ON position, stop trying to reset the breaker. There may be a fault in the circuit, and you'll need to contact a qualified electrician.

When power goes out to an area of your home, it's often just a temporary power surge. You may be able



to restore power on your own by simply resetting the breaker.

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of winning grant funds. specializes Aerinet in electric cooperative grant services in Colorado and across the nation. To date we have submitted over \$8 million in requests for funds specifically for solar facilities. The timing associated with receiving grant funds will affect when we complete construction. Minimally, we intend to break ground this year. The project(s) consist of one megawatt built at Creede Substation and one megawatt to be built at Moffat Substation on SLVREC properties. A construction agreement has been awarded to a company called AgriPower Solar.

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Recipe of the Month

INGREDIENTS

6 bell peppers 1 T. extra-virgin olive oil

- 1 lb. boneless, skinless chicken breasts
- 1 t. dried oregano

Kosher salt

Freshly ground black pepper

1-1/2 c. low-sodium chicken stock or water, divided

1 c. couscous

- 1 small red onion, chopped
- 1 zucchini, chopped
- 1 clove garlic, finely chopped
- 1 c. quartered cherry tomatoes
- 1/2 c. Kalamata olives, pitted, chopped
- 2 T. chopped fresh dill
- 1 c. crumbled feta, divided
- Lemon wedges, for serving

GREEK STUFFED PEPPERS

1. Preheat oven to 350°. Slice off top of bell peppers. Discard stems and remove ribs and seeds. Arrange peppers upright in a large casserole dish.

2. In a large skillet over medium heat, heat oil. Add chicken and oregano; season with salt and pepper. Cook, turning occasionally, until chicken is golden brown and no longer pink, about 8 minutes per side. Transfer to a cutting board and let rest 5 minutes, then finely chop.

3. In a medium saucepan over medium-high heat, bring 1 cup stock to a boil. Remove pot from heat. Stir in couscous. Cover pot with a tight-fitting lid. Let sit until couscous is tender and liquid is absorbed, about 5 minutes.

4. Transfer couscous and chicken to a large bowl. Add onion, zucchini, garlic, tomatoes, olives, dill, and 1/2 cup feta; season with salt and pepper and toss to combine.

5. Stuff couscous mixture into peppers. Sprinkle with remaining 1/2 cup feta. Pour remaining 1/2 cup stock into baking dish (to help peppers steam) and cover with foil.

6. Bake peppers until tender and cheese is melty, 42 to 45 minutes. Serve with lemon wedges alongside. *www.delish.com*
